

### BY THE CALENDAR

- November, 1956 BURGETTSTOWN AREA MERGED SCHOOL DISTRICT created by vote of the electorate of Burgettstown Borough, Jefferson and Smith Townships.
- December, 1956 Application for secondary school space allocations submitted for approval to the Department of Public Instruction.
- March, 1960 Room schedule and space allocations received from Department of Public Instruction and State Public School Building Authority approves financing of project.
- May, 1960 BURGETTSTOWN AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT, State Public School Building Authority and A. E. Tennyson,
- Architect sign professional agreement and leases for construction of BURGETTS-TOWN AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT Junior-Senior High School Building.

- JUNE, 1960 Preliminary building plans submitted for approval to Department of Public Instruction and State Public School Building Authority.
- MAY, 1960 Final building plans accepted and approved by all state agencies. Construction bids advertised, received and reviewed.

June, 1961 - Final bids awarded

August, 1961 - Construction started


- September, 1961 Movable furniture and equipment specified and prepared for bidding
- January, 1963 Furniture bids received, reviewed and awarded.
- March, 1963 Furniture delivery commences partial occupancy requested and obtained for school purposes.




