## 1930 by Angie Wentworth Jacobs

My father worked on the J. P. White dairy farm. When I was 7 and started to school, I rode in a school bus driven by horses. If there was a big snowdrift, we got out and walked the rest of the way. Coming home, the bus came the other way because of the hill and I was the last one off the bus. A long day for a little girl. The bus driver was Mr. Carlye.

Then I remember when we wound the May Pole in May of 1930. We had a big frost that killed all the gardens and turned the leaves brown on the trees. We had to wear cheesecloth dresses to wind the May Pole. It was so cold!!!!!!

I have fond memories of our class going to Washington, D.C. And the trip on the boat to Mt. Vernon, George Washington's home. The 1930 class was the last class to go because of the banks going bad.


I was a graduate of H.V.S. All the Dhans family graduated from H.V.S. Frank and Jim in 1921, Flora J. in 1924, Angileen C. and I in 1932 and Bernard in 1940.

I have a few good memories to think about. In my sophomore year, I went to the state farm show. Our demonstration "Making Salads" came in 2nd in the state. Also that year, I was part of the May Queen's Court.

My sister, Angileen and I were on the basketball team (1929-"30) that came in $1^{\text {st }}$ in the county. Angileen got a medal for the best forward and I for the best side center of the county. Our team didn't lose a game that year. How can one forget the pep rallies before the games and our Prom in the gym?

We had 32 graduates - 13 are living as of today $-1 / 31 / 2000$.

For my first 2 years, I went to Bushy Rock School, which was 1 mile from Woodrow. Most of the time we walked, but when it snowed a lot, we rode the farm sled pulled by a team of horses. When we went to Hickory, for about 2 or 3 years, we rode a horse drawn bus. In the winter, a charcoal foot box was put in the center of the bus to keep us from freezing.

My father, James Andrew Alexander McGugin, graduated from Hickory Academy, but I am not sure whether my mother, Edna Pearl Paul McGugin, attended or graduated. My sisters: Gertrude McGugin Phillips (1923), Mabel McGugin Lawton (1926), Mary Jane McGugin Stough (1930) and I all graduated from The Hickory Vocational High School. My sister, Mabel, was the school nurse at Hickory for 3 or 4 years, so I rode to school with her. One time, there was a real wet snow. She drove till we got stuck, then we walked the rest of the way. No overshoes! I was really wet by the time we got to the school.

One year, I drove our International tractor to school to enter the tractor pull during the farm fair. It had a wide fly-wheel, one gear forward, one reverse and was real slow. I hooked up to the slab with my rubber-tired tractor, put it in low gear and it did move the slab! My dad said later that I would have been mighty embarrassed if the tractor couldn't have pulled it.

## 1935 by Edith Scott Dewey

In 1933, the school started a Commercial Course to add to the Agricultural and Home Economics Courses, to make it more of a Vocational School. I was one of the few who completed the two-year course in 1935. It was very useful in the jobs I held and, in fact, still use some shorthand, now after 65 years. Vivian Yanney was our Commercial teacher and the class was held in the room beyond the Library.

Three of my Uncles and an Aunt graduated from The Hickory Academy before the present High School building was built. The building was later W.K. Allison Hardware and now owned by Jay Allison. For those who have never been behind the main hardware store (and Post Office), more than half of the building is a large open area with a stage at the back with a small room on each side for entering the stage.

Mr . Bill McCoy, who lived on a farm right outside of town toward Venice, would hitch up his team of horses (with bells) to a sled when we had a lot of snow and come to town to pick up his daughter, Zelma. We "city" kids would break our necks to run out of school first, in order to ride on the sled. The sled was full of kids and each would jump over near his home.

When Eli Wiggins was the Ag teacher, he and the Ag boys held a fair a few years. The gym was made into booths and tiers of shelves for the farmers and whoever, to display their vegetables, fruits, quilts, handwork, etc. These were judged and given ribbons to those who won or placed. One year while all in progress, the lights went out because of all the extra use of electricity. The Home Ec girls also had a little lunchroom and sold snacks or whatever. A Minstrel was also held for a couple of years during the fair. Some of the local people were in the main chorus and spokespeople and we, students, were in the background chorus.

How many alumni remember the time a student was shot in the Hickory High School parking lot? It must have been the spring of " 32 or possibly, cherry season of "33. I know I was either in first or second grade when it happened. Just as school was dismissed and we were scurrying to get on the bus, a SHOT rang out!

A "big kid" from the high school had climbed the fence and picked some cherries from a tree on the property adjacent to the parking lot. The property owner did not take kindly to sharing his fruit and had come out firing at the intruder. I recall seeing blood on top of one of the parked cars where the victim had fallen, wounded. My recollection is that the student was shot in the leg and survived. His name was never known to me. But it was a very scary and unforgettable event for me.

Miss Giffin was our first grade teacher. I liked her a lot. But there was one incident during the school year that diminished my admiration of her, just a bit.

The girl, who sat across the aisle from me stole my pencil. When I told Miss Giffin about it, the girl denied it. She said her mother had bought it for her. But that was not possible because it was a pencil that could not be purchased. It had the inscription, "D. M. Phillips General Merchandise and Service Station, Woodrow, Pa" printed on it. That was my dad's business and he only gave the pencils away. I knew he did not GIVE her one!

I fully expected Miss Giffin to take the disputed pencil and then, later, quietly restore it to me. She never did, and that's why I never forgot the incident - though I must admit, after all these years, I no longer remember the name of the little liar/thief who sat across the aisle in the first room on the right as you enter our school.

When we were in $7^{\text {th }}$ or $8^{\text {th }}$ grade, one of the boys brought an Esquire magazine to school. It got passed around until Miss Carlisle or Miss Herriott found it. Miss Betty Sawhill, $3^{\text {rd }}, 4^{\text {th }}$ and $5^{\text {th }}$ grade teacher, left the room to talk to Mrs Cooke in the $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ grade room.
