SEWICKLEY HEIGHTS – Without question, the golfer who had the longest wait in Thursday's WPIAL Class AA Golf Championships was Austin Lis.

The senior from Burgettstown High School came in with the seventh group in a field of 15 with an iffy score of 11-over par 81 over the 6,143-yard hilly course on a rainy afternoon at Allegheny Country Club.

Would he be one of the 16 qualifiers?

It took nearly an hour for him to find out he was, finishing in 15th place.

"It was a good, long wait," said Lis. "I wasn't too confident coming off 18. I didn't think it would be enough."

Lis was one of five area golfers to advance to the PIAA West Region Tournament Oct. 17 at Tom's Run Golf Course in Blairsville. The other four were Colin Chapman and Hunter Donahue from McGuffey, Aaron Yorio of Waynesburg and Christian Sadler of Bentworth.

Skyler Fox, a freshman from Riverside, won the gold medal with a 2-over 72. He became the first champion in Riverside's history.

Fox stepped into the lead when Jason Li, a senior from Sewickley Academy and the defending champion, had a quadruple-bogey 8 on the par-4 14th. Still, Fox birdied 17th and nearly holed out a chip shot on 18 to force a playoff. Li finished tied for second with Tyler Brinker of South Park at 3-over par.

"I was pretty confident coming in," said Fox. "I felt I was playing good enough to win."

McGuffey had a strong effort with Chapman, a senior who shot 4-over 84 that was good enough for a tie for fourth place; and Donahue, a junior who shot 78 and tied for 11th place.

Donahue hovered at the top of the leaderboard until a double-bogey 5 on the par-

3 15th. Donahue played the par-3s in 8-over-par.

"I played really well, except for the par 3s," Donahue said. "That nearly killed me. I wanted to stay below the hole. The greens were really fast. I made some mental changes in my game. I used to get down on myself after a bad shot. I tried to stop doing that."

Chapman was 2-over heading into the final two holes and had a chance to win. But bogeys on Nos. 17 and 18, both par-4s, put him tied for fourth.

"I had 31 putts and that's what saved me," said Chapman. "The main thing I needed to get down was the speed of the greens. That's what ultimately saved me. This was my best round because it moved me on to (regionals)."

Yorio, a junior from

Waynesburg, had the shot of the day, getting a hole-in-one on the par-3, 130-yard No. 15 hole that helped him move on to the regional tournament. His 9-iron shot hit above the hole and spun back into the cup for his first ace.

"Tve come really close before," Yorio said. "I've been inches. I definitely needed that because it wasn't looking good til then. I was on the bubble until that happened."

Sadler, a junior, birdied the par-3 15th, which secured his spot of qualifiers.

"I shot a bad 79 because I missed some short putts, some par putts I needed to make, but I hit the ball pretty good," said Sadler. "I kind of realized upper 70s would be pretty close. So I knew I was close."

The toughest finish went to California's Nate Luketich, who finished tied for 16th and required a playoff with Josh Redding of Southmoreland for the final berth to the regional tournament. Redding birdied the first playoff hole, No. 1, thanks to a bunker shot that ended up four inches from the hole. Luketich will serve as an alternate, meaning he can get in if another player who finished ahead of him pulls out.

"Three holes killed me," said Luketich, who had double-bogeys on the par-4 No. 2; a triple on the par-4 16th and a double on the par-4 18th. "On 16, I lost my tee shot ... and on 18, I had a few putting mistakes."

Vallina retiring from junior golf tour after 30 years

When Don York asked Jon Vallina to help with the Southwest Pennsylvania Junior Golf Tour, he said ves. Anything to help a friend and boost golf in the area was agreeable to Vallina.

When York asked Vallina to take over as president two vears later, he couldn't say no. He wanted the tour to continue so his answer was ves.

"Don talked me into it." said Vallina. "I thought I'd

be there a couple years then find someone to take over."

Vallina staved for 28 years.



Vallina oversaw the growth of the tour and will now turn over

his responsibilities to Brian Vensel, who has been with the tour for the past decade.

Vallina was recently appointed Associate Executive Director for the Pennsylvania State Athletic Directors Association. He is responsible for recruiting corporate sponsorship for PSADA and his reach will be statewide.

Burgettstown High School He is also responsible for the PSADA Hall of Fame.

"What Don York did was make golf affordable for all those kids," Vallina said. "This tour has helped improved the quality of golf in southwestern Pennsylvania. We have had a lot more top-10 finishes in the state tournament of kids who

played on the tour."

The SPJGT had a high of 250 participants a few years ago. The total is between 180 and 200 this year. Vallina said. That number includes nearly 50 females.

It's an all-volunteer organization and the golf courses donate the tee times and green fees for these events. The first 132 golfers to sign up can play in the tournaments each week.

"They told us to bring as many kids as vou can." Vallina said of the area golf pros. "They are going to be their future golfers."

The SPJGT is available to beginners through high school with age 13 and under competing in 9-hole events and the others in 18-hole tournaments. An annual membership is \$15, which gives the player the opportunity to participate for only \$9 per tournament.

The SPJGT venues include some of the best private and public courses in southwestern Pennsylvania. Information about the tour can be found at www.spigt. com.

One worth repeating

Practice makes perfect as Vallina earns second boys title

BELLE VERNON - After shooting a one-over-par 73 here Monday, David Vallina was sitting in the Cedarbrook Golf Course restaurant, munching on a sandwich and receiving congratulations for successfully defending the WPIAL individual boys golf championship.

He felt pretty good about his

Then his uncle, Burgettstown High School golf coach Jon Vallina, walked into the restaurant with the news. Upper St. Clair junior Mark Cimarolli had just holed an 80yard wedge shot at No. 18 for an eagle. Cimarolli also would finish with a 73 to force a sudden death playoff.

"My heart dropped straight to my stomach," Vallina said.

A good workout on the practice range helped Vallina to regain his composure, and a brilliant eight-iron shot that he had worked on during the warm-up led to a six-foot birdie putt on the second extra hole. And this time, Vallina really won his secstraight WPIAL champi-

Vallina, a senior at Burgettstown, becomes the first Washington County player to win a pair of WPIAL titles and joins some rare company of two-time winners. Included on that list of eight players is a guy who won a few tournaments in his career, Latrobe High School graduate Arnold Palmer

It was a memorable day for the Burgettstown team, as seniors Ryan Zurowski (78) and Sean Dove (79) joined Vallina in qualifying for the PIAA Championships, to be held Oct. 22-23 at Penn State. Zurowski placed fifth while Dove was sixth. Only six players managed to break 80.

Waynesburg sophomore Robert Rohanna edged Pine-Richland's David Dankmyer for third place in a playoff after shooting a 77.

Frank Palermo, a senior at Upper St. Clair, and USC sophomore Matt McGinnis also qualified for the state championships with 81s. Vallina, who started the day

with a six-inch, tap-in birdie at No. 1, appeared to be cruising to the title defense, as putting horror stories wiped out the competition. When Vallina finished with seven straight pars for the 73, it appeared no one could challenge him.

But along came Cimarolli. And he pulled off the shot of the tourna ment, even if he never saw it, or had no idea what its impact would be.


"They said it just trickled in," said Cimarolli, who was hitting into an elevated 18th. green. "Then my teammates came and told me what it meant."

Both players had par on the first extra hole. But at the second sudden death hole, a par-three, 184-yard shot over a pond, Vallina hit an eight-iron to within six feet. Cimarolli also hit an eight-iron, but was a bit strong and was faced with a long downhill putt for birdie. His attempt slid past the hole. and Vallina calmly sank his twisting, six-foot putt to win a tournament he thought he had wrapped up two hours earlier

"I hit 10 balls on the practice range with a punch eight-iron and it paid off," Vallina said. "I was trying to think of what shots I would be playing on the first few playoff holes, so I practiced those shots. It paid off."

Rohanna will be making his second straight trip to the PIAA tournament, and was excited with the playoff win for a third place medal.

"I said on the way here that shooting below 78 was my goal," said Ro-hanna. "I didn't think 77 would place me as high as it did, but the course played hard."
