Burgettstown rallies to stop Sewickley Academy

BURGETTSTOWN-After Burgettstown defeated its last five section opponents by an average of 12 runs per game, Blue Devils head softball coach Mark Deer welcomed a game against talented Sewickley Academy at Pradetto Field Thursday.

Though Burgettstown defeated the Panthers by six runs in the first meeting April 1, Sewickley Academy entered the Section 1-A matchup in second place, one game behind the Blue Devils.

Burgettstown found itself trailing by three runs and forced to make an early pitching change, but the Blue Devils fought back and Morgan Ellek had a walk-off single in the bottom of the seventh inning to lift the Blue Devils to a 6-5 victory in James F. Hillman Park.

Burgettstown sophomore pitcher Katie Tarr, who relieved Ellek in the third inning with the Blue Devils trailing 3-0, helped make sure Burgettstown would strengthen its hold on first place in the section.

"This win was a huge confidence booster for us," Tarr said. "We knew it was going to be a tough game, even though we beat them the first time. We want the section title and definitely did not want to give them a chance to share it with us."

The win puts the Blue Devils (9-0, 11-4) two games ahead of the Panthers (7-2, 7-2) in the standings. With just three Section 1-A games remaining, a section title is within reach.

entering the bottom of the sixth inning before its offense came to life. Back-to-back singles from sophomore first baseman Cheyenne Winters and senior second baseman Bryanna Lonick started the inning, and a throwing error scored Lonick. Sophomore center fielder Cassie Carnes then hit a two-out, two-run single to give the Blue Devils a lead.

"We have a great lineup," Deer said. "Hits can happen anywhere in our batting order. When someone is struggling, another player steps up."

Six of the Blue Devils' nine players had at least one hit and three recorded a multihit game.

With a two-run lead, Tarr took the mound in the seventh with the top half of Sewickley Academy's batting waiting. After recording one out, Panthers junior catcher Sarah Manzinger walked and

Sewickley Academy had its best hitter stepping to the plate-freshman left fielder Chandler White, who was 3-for-4 with a tworun home run in the first inning. White hit the fourth pitch from Tarr into the gap in left-center field to score Goebel and tie the game, 5-5. Tarr closed out the inning with a ground out on the next at-bat.

"They are a very good team" Panthers head coach Win Palmer said. "We love playing them because they are so wellcoached and they play hard. I wish we could

play them every game."

Sewickley sophomore pitcher Savannah Henry got the first two batters in the bottom of the seventh to ground out before Lonick hit a double and Ellek, who went 2-for-4 with two RBI and a run, drilled the first pitch she saw into right field to score the game-winning run.

"In that situation, you just have to go up there and block everything out," Ellek said. "You have to hit anything that comes your way, and it was great that it worked out. It's always nice to have a tough game like that."

For the 18th time in his 19 years as Burgettstown's head coach, Deer's team is headed to the WPIAL postseason. And the Blue Devils did it with only one senior, two juniors, six sophomores and two freshmen receiving regular playing time.

"Tve been at Burgettstown for 19 years and while this is probably the youngest team I've coached, they might be one of the most talented," Deer said.

SSB gets even, stops Burgettstown in 8 innings

HOOKSTOWN - The ups and downs of this rivalry took another unexpected turn Tuesday afternoon.

Burgettstown's softball team, hoping to put itself into position to win the Section 2-AA title, needed a victory over rival South Side Beaver to do so.

Last month, the Blue Devils fell behind in the top of the sixth inning, then exploded for five runs in the bottom of the inning for a dramatic victory.

South Side Beaver drew its revenge yesterday, when third baseman Toni Yocoviello laced a solid single to right field with one out in the bottom of the eighth inning that scored Mackenzie Smith with the winning run in a 2-1 victory.

The Blue Devils had rallied to tie the score, 1-1, in the previous inning and appeared ready to again snatch a late-inning win from the Rams.

"It's a big rivalry. All the

kids know each other," said Burgettstown head coach Mark Deer. "Some of their kids played for us in the summer a couple years ago so we know them and they know us."

Qualifying for the playoffs was not at stake in this game – both teams are in – but the Blue Devils (10-2, 14-6) needed a win, coupled with a loss by Avonworth to Freedom, to win the section outright. Avonworth finished first in the section, thanks to a victory over Freedom last night. This will be Burgettstown's 20th appearance in the playoffs in Deer's 21 years as head coach.

South Side Beaver (9-3, 12-3) could not improve its playoff standing, locked behind the top two teams no matter what, but this was a game that the Rams will cherish for a number of reasons.

"It's always tough playing them," said South Side Beaver head coach Amy Pieto. "They are such a good team. We came out, had a good showing and came out on top."

Katie Tarr, a senior for Bur-

gettstown who is headed to Point Park in the fall, matched South Side Beaver starter Mackenzie Smith zero for zero until the bottom of the sixth.

With Connor McGaffic, a Pitt recruit and one of the better power hits in the WPIAL, due to lead off, Deer told catcher Nia Winters to tell Tarr not to offer any good pitches. McGaffic worked the count to 3-1 when Tarr left a fastball too close to the plate and the right-handed hitter launched a home run over the right-field fence to give the Rams a 1-0 lead.

"I don't know how many home runs she has off the top of my head," Pieto said. "She has been pitched around a lot."

But Burgettstown clawed back, grinding out a run in the top of the seventh when Paige Sherman singled to right field and courtesy runner Taylor Cullison was sacrificed to second on a bunt by Hannah Abbott. Winters then whacked a liner to right field that went for a double and scored Cullison.

South Side Beaver, which

has won seven of the last eight games, got four of its nine hits in the bottom of the eighth inning. Reagan Huzak sent a single to left field and tried to stretch it into a double but was thrown out by Tori Carnes. Smith followed with a single to center and moved to second on a bloop single to right by McGaffic. Hunter Hands hit into a fielder's choice that erased McGaffic but moved Smith to third base. Yacoviello followed with the game-winning hit.

"It was good to get the hits," said Pieto, who has the Rams in the playoffs for a second straight season after taking over two years ago. "That was good to see. We have a lot of good hitters so I was hopeful we could come back from those missteps."

Burgettstown's defense stopped South Side Beaver from scoring a run in the second and another in fifth. Winters made two outstanding defensive plays, snagging a line drive by Yacoviello and making a nice pickup on a ball hit by Lena Pieto, the head

coach's daughter, to end the second and stranding Rachael Pieto, Lena's sister, on second base.

She amassed 120 strikeouts in 77 ²/3 innings and walked only 23 batters. She led the conference in strikeouts and strikeouts per game, and was third in ERA.

Kassie Kesneck, a sophomore from Houston and a Chartiers-Houston graduate, had another outstanding season for Indiana in the PSAC's Central Division.

In basketball

Youngstown State sophomore Mary Dunn, a Washington native and Trinity graduate, was voted to the Horizon League Women's Basketball All-Academic team for her success on the court and in the classroom.

Dunn was a key part of the Penguins' success down the stretch as they won nine of their last 11 games in the finish in the team standings.

Tarr led Point Park's pitch-regular season. YSU advanced to the postseason for the third time in the last four seasons and hosted a first round game in the Women's Basketball Invitational.

> Dunn averaged 6.8 points and 3.8 rebounds while ranking third in the Horizon League with a .547 field-goal percentage. That percentage led the team. She also paced the Penguins with 27 blocked shots.
