Hilverding, competing in the boys Class AA race, finished in 16:28 for a sixth-place finish, just 27 seconds beind winner Dominic Hockenbury of Lake-Lehman.

DeVecchio, competing in the boys Class A event, matched Hilverding, finishing in 16:28 for an eighthplace finish.

Ethan Linderman, who finished 32nd overall in a time of 16:35. North Allegheny won the team championship.

Ovolio gets hall of fame call from La Roche

Phil Ovolio, an Eighty Four native, was recently inducted into the La Roche College Athletic Hall of Fame.

A former standout baseball player at Canon-McMillan before attending La Roche, Ovolio was one of six inductees in the Red Hawks' 2016 hall of fame class. Induction ceremonies were held in late January.

A 2009 La Roache graduate, Ovolio had a distinguished baseball career with the Red Hawks. He ranked second on the school's all-time pitching wins list when he graduated and is currently ranked fourth. In addition to his 15 career victories, Ovolio threw 11 complete games and struck out 108 batters.

He was on the La Roche team that won the Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference regular-season championship in 2007 and helped the Red Hawks to the AMCC championship game in 2006 and 2007. Ovolio threw one no-hitter during the 2007 season, which sparked a winning streak as La Roche won 11 of its next 12 games en route to the AMCC regular-season championship. Ovolio received the 2009

AMCC Faculty Representative Award given to the top academic student-athlete in the conference.

"La Roche and the baseball field always feels welcoming. It never feels like you were gone for very long," Ovolio said of his induction.

Penn State Beaver senior guard Morgan Kurtz was named

Kurtz, a Trinity graduate, surpassed the 1,500-point mark for her career when she scored 23 points against Penn State-Wilkes-Barre Jan. 29. One day later, she set the school's single-game scoring record with a 36-point performance in a 98-56 win over Penn State Worthington-Scranton. Kurtz made 12 of 17 shots, including six of nine three-pointers, and converted six of seven free throws during the recordsetting game. Kurtz also had 10 rebounds, 10 steals and four assists for the week.

Kurtz has scored at least 18 points in five consecutive games. For the season, she is the second-leading scorer for Penn State Beaver, averaging 17.0 points per game. The Lions are 11-1 in conference play and 14-9 overall.

• Wike Lamberti, a South Fayette graduate and former Observer-Reporter Boys Basketball Player of the Year, has been a key player for West Liberty, which is ranked No. 3 in NCAA Division II.

A senior forward, Lamberti is averaging 9.0 points and 4.1 rebounds per game for the Hilltoppers (20-2) and is shooting 61 percent from the field. In an 84-77 win Feb. 4 over 8th-ranked Fairmont State, Lamberti scored 17 points and grabbed eight rebounds.

One of the top women's pole vaulters in NCAA Division III, Kalsey won the event last week at the Jim Wuske Invitational hosted by Mount Union College. Kalsey cleared a season-best 12-9½, equaling

the second-best height in the country this season.

Kalsey also placed second out of 44 competitors from Division I, II, III and NAIA schools at the SPIRE Midwest Open Jan. 30 in Geneva, Ohio. She cleared 12-0½.

At the season-opening Youngstown State University Icebreaker, Kalsey proved that she was already in midseason form by clearing 12-0¾ for a first-place finish.

A Fort Cherry graduate, Dysert is competing in the weight throw. NEW ATHLETIC RECORD MADE BY SCHOOL GIRL

Frances Kanzius, Union High School Student, Sets up New Record at Association Meet

Miss Frances Kanzius, Union high school student and athlete extraordinary, won new laurels for herself and her associates of the Burgettstown Athletic Club at Pittsburgh on Saturday, contesting in the annual meet of the Allegheny Mountain Association. While others of the local team gave excellent accounts of themselves, the prowess of Miss Kanzius was shown conspicuously. Miss Kanzius is 17 years old and has been a champion in athletic sports for several years.

The young lady, who is perhaps better known by her nick-name, "Fritzie," was the winner of four first places in the Saturday meet, and established one new record, taking altogether 44 points for her team. No other team competing were able to match this record. "Fritzie" won the broad jump, the discus throw, the baseball and javelin throws. In the next to the last discus throw she hurled the disc a distance of 104 feet, five inches, a new record; her broad jump was 12 feet, eight inches; she threw the baseball 228 feet 16 inches, and the javelin 89 feet, two inches.

The Burgettstown team scored points in every event except the running broad jump. The 400 metre relay race was won by Burgettstown with Loretta Clark, Mary Dugas, Mary Karnecnik and Pearl Allen making up the team. The event was won in 1:04.8 time.

Other individual point winners of the Burgettstown group were Loretta Clark, second in the 50 metre dash, and second in the broad jump; Mary Luckjohn, winner in the eight-pound shot put, and second in the discus throw; Pearl Allen, second in the 100 metre dash and third in the 200 metre dash; Mary Karnecnik, third in the 50 metre dash.

Other teams finishing behind Burgettstown in the meet were the Union A. C. of Turtle Creek, Slippery Rock State Teachers College and Monongahela Turners.



Shimko captures three medals

Olivia Shimko, a sophomore at Burgettstown High School, captured three individual medals at the Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League Track and Field Championship held recently at South Side Beaver High School. By placing fourth in the javelin event, Shimko qualified for the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association State Championships May 27-28 at Shippensburg University. Shimko placed seventh in the long jump and eighth in the 100m dash at the WPIAL meet. Shimko and her coaches, Kelly Ward, Mark Druga and Bill Rizor, as well as fellow track member Kelsey Bartoletti, attended the two-day track and field event at Shippensburg University. Although Shimko did not medal at states, she said the level of competition and the number of participants she found at the meet made her realize she must set higher goals and standards for future endeavors in track and field. Shimko had the fourth best throw in the javelin among class AA girls with a throw of 110.25, a fifth best leap in the long jump of 16 feet 7 inches and a personal best of 12.7 seconds in the 100m run, which was seventh best in the WPIAL. Shimko lettered in volleyball and basketball this year and plans on participating in three sports in her upcoming years at Burgettstown Middle/High School. She is the daughter of Mike and Mary Shimko of Burgettstown.

Fort Cherry freshman runner has a lot on her mind

The Fort Cherry freshman is as talented as they come, winning the 200-meter dash and finishing second in the grueling 400 dash at the WPIAL Class AA Track & Field Championships at Baldwin High School Thursdav.

Defining which compet-

itor is more dangerous is the easy part for Whalen. But she says she spends too much time worrving about that instead of concentrating on her own performance.

Before winning the 200, Whalen took silver in the 400. finishing with a time of 60.88. She was one second behind another freshman, Emma Pavalek of Beaver, and a few paces ahead of Emily Prasko of Burgettstown (61:01).

"It was one of my worst races," Whalen said, "I was out of my head and I think I

Mays finished the 800 in eighth place last year to medal but not qualify.

"Honestly, (at states) I just want to beat this time." Mays said. "If I could get another (personal record), that would be great. I'm pretty excited."

Joining Mays at the state meet will be senior teammate Sam Snodgrass, who has been a regular at competing at that level in the 1.600 run.

The top-seeded Snodgrass finished outside the automatic top-4 qualifiers, but was

able to advance by beating the qualifying time with a 4:24.01. Snodgrass finished in fifth place.

"I was really looking to win it," Snodgrass said. "I was a little impatient and started my kick a little early. I ended up getting outkicked in the end. I'm happy to make it to states but not pleased overall with the place. I feel blessed to be able to have the chance of reaching one of my main goals, running under 4:20, because it wasn't going to happen (at the WPIAL Championships)."

Snodgrass made the PIAA

Championships last year but failed to advance to the finals in the 1,600. And with only a few races remaining in his high-school career. he knows what needs to be done to improve on Thursday's fifth-place finish.

"I have to be more patient," Snodgrass said. "What I've learned over my four years of racing the 1,600 is that it's all about patience. You have to wait and time that final kick. That's when you go."
