The Three Springs Church.—The primitive Three Springs church was a hewed log structure. It was located on the land now in the possession of Bartly Campbell, about a mile and a half east of Holliday's Cove. The church was erected in about 1790. Services were held there until in the year 1812. Of the early history of the congregation no accurate information can be procured, except that of a call dated November 20, 1799, and is signed by Philip Jackson, James Proudfoot, Samuel Merchant, Samuel Marquiss, James Merchant, William Jackson, John Goodman Young, William Lee, John Coulter, John Wylie, William Ledlie and John Orr. This call was for Rev. Elisha McCurdy, who was among the first ministers in this church. The ground upon which the church was built was donated by the two James Campbells. There is also a graveyard at the place, near where the church stood, where many of the early settlers of the neighborhood are buried. In the year 1805 a great revival, known as the "falling down," took place. The following is taken from the Life of Macurdy, concerning it.

On Sabbath, the 13th of September, 1802, preparatory to the administration of the Lord's Supper at Three Springs, which was appointed to take place on the fourth Sabbath of September an unusually large number of people attended. In the morning Mr. Macurdy lectured on Malachi 3:1-5, "Behold, I will send my messenger," &c. In the afternoon, he preached from Joshua 24:15, "Choose you this day whom ye will serve." While reading the text, uncommon solemnity pervaded the assembly. The preacher himself felt awfully solemn. He read the text a second time. The point to which he directed his efforts, in the treatment of the subject, was to bring his hearers to a decision, by showing them that they were shut up to this necessity—that they must either choose to serve God, or they must choose not to serve him. This fearful alternative, he pressed upon them, with much earnestness and solemnity. At the close of his remarks on this point, he stood silent in the tent, from which he had been addressing them. As he paused, the people, who had been scattered over a considerable space, gathered closely around the tent, as if in expectation of something further. Observing the inquiring expression, with which they gazed upon him, he resumed his discourse, and with solemn emphasis, said, "God and you must decide this question; and I now call upon you to give in your decision to God." Immediately the whole congregation rose to their feet, evincing very deep concern. Under these circumstances, he addressed them further, assuring them that God was a merciful God, and if there were any among them who had not chosen Him as their portion, they had still the opportunity to do so. And, again, he put the question, "Will you now give in your decision to serve the Lord your God?" This was the occasion of greatly increasing the anxiety which already existed, and many, unable to stand, fell back upon the benches, which were used as seats. In the midst of this intense excitement, he dismissed the congregation, and returned home. The people, themselves, after he had retired, appointed a meeting for prayer, to be held in the evening, which was attended upon with great interest. About fifty persons continued upon the ground, appeared unwilling to go away, and spent the most of the night in social worship.

On the Thursday following, which was observed as a fast, preparatory to the administration of the Lord's Supper, more than usual solemnity prevailed throughout the services. A prayer-meeting was appointed, to be held in the evening, at the house of one of the elders. A number of persons proceeded thither directly from church. Mr. Macurdy followed towards evening. Before the commencement of the religious exercises, while walking near the house, and revolving in his mind what he should say to the people, he heard cries of distress, in a plat of wood-land which lay in the vicinity. Supposing them to be the cries of persons under concern about their souls, he asked one of the elders to go with him, that they might ascertain the fact. Upon their arrival at the place, they found two young women who had retired to the woods to pray, prostrate on the ground, in deep distress in relation to their eternal interests. "Their cries for mercy were very affecting." After some conversation with them, they were taken to the house, where a large crowd of people were assembled for worship. There they were very powerfully affected and cried out, on account of the pungency of their convictions. This, however, did not interfere with the services of the evening. These proceeded without interruption, and so imperceptibly and rapidly did the hours pass away, in prayer and exhortation, that before the people were aware of it the morning light dawned upon them. The whole night was spent in religious exercises.

The next morning Mr. Macurdy, and the elder who was with him, proceeded toward the church, where a meeting of the ses-

sion had been appointed to converse with applicants for admission to the Lord's table. On their way they heard cries of distress in the woods, and going to the place whence they came, found a number of anxious persons engaged in prayer. Having reached the church, they spent the day conversing with inquirers after salvation. None as yet expressed a hope, and none, of course, were admitted to the communion of the church. A prayer-meeting was again held in the evening. The night was spent, as was the preceding one, in prayer and exhortation, the exercises being continued until day-light broke unexpectedly upon them, so intense and absorbing was the interest which they felt on the occasion.

The Rev. John Brice had been previously engaged to assist at the communion. On his way to the church, on Saturday morning, Mr. Macurdy fell in with him, and informed him of the state of things in the congregation. The effect on him was overwhelming. He seemed unable to endure it, and declared that he would return home, as he felt himself unfit to preach where the Lord was thus pouring out his spirit. Through the persuasion of Mr. Macurdy he proceeded to the church and preached. During the service great solemnity prevailed. Gracious influence was imparted, and many had their minds awakened to a concern for their salvation. At the close of the meeting, when the congregation was dismissed, a number were prostrate and unable to leave the ground. Two prayer meetings were appointed for the evening, at different places in the congregation. In these the greater part of the night was spent in social worship. Few, if any, slept, so powerful and exciting was the feeling which pervaded these meetings.

On Wednesday night, September 29, "far exceeded anything that had been before; many were prostrate, crying for mercy. About the break of day on Tuesday morning, there were six persons who gave evidence of obtaining hope in Jesus." The exercises were continued until about eleven o'clock, when, with great difficulty, the people were prevailed upon to disperse. * * * * * This was a very solemn season; the people were almost universally bowed down, some deeply affected and lying prostrate, their cries for mercy being enough to pierce the Heavens, while they appeared to be on the brink of despair. Some few obtained relief before day, who have since given evidence of serious and comfortable exercise. A goodly number who have been admitted to the table of the Lord since that time, have dated their first deep and abiding convictions from that season. It was a night to be held in everlasting remembrance, for which, it is hoped, many will praise God eternally. At this time some began to speak the language of Canaan with solemn, sweet serenity of mind, and in heavenly heart affecting accents."

In the year 1812 this society erected a stone church on the land now owned by John White, where the Three Springs graveyard is. This building was used for church purposes until in 1846, when a division occurred in the congregation, and a part of them went to Paris, Pa., and assisted in the erection of a church building there, and the remaining went to Holliday's Cove. The stone church was removed but a few years ago. The members that went to the Cove formed an organization and held their meetings in the Academy building for a number of years. The society erected a church in the Cove called

THE HOLLIDAY'S COVE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH,

which was completed in 1860, the dimensions of which were 34x40. In its early days this church had its difficulties and struggles, as nearly all others have had. But the vine God plants he waters and prunes that it may be fruitful. The church edifice cost \$3,198. Among the pastors are found the names of Thos. M. Newell, G. C. Crow, J. B. Stewart, — Billingsly, and the present pastor, J. B. Graham. Among the prominent and active members are the names of Thomas Orr, William Brown, William Withrow, G. G. Orr, James Adams and the Campbells.

Revs. Campbell, Churchill and Brown were also ministers who supplied them with the Word of God in the old stone church.

Rev. John B. Graham was called in 1865, and has filled the pulpit until the present time. His pastorage there has been fruitful "in gathering them into the fold." He was installed by Dr. Stockton, who preached the sermon, and Rev. Pomeroy delivered the charge. He is well spoken of there as a minister and citizen.

EARLY SETTLERS

- 1775 Philip Ball patented 1,000 acres, including a part of the Cove, and extending back to King's Creek. The land is now owned by many different families.
- 1776 Mr. John Holliday settled, in what used to be known as Holliday's Cove.
- 1779 Or 1780, Abraham Croxon settled on the farm later owned by Alexander Edie.
- 1780 James Allison settled.
- 1782 George Chapman settled on the farm later owned by his son Alfred.
- 1782 William Griffith settled in the Cove on the farm later owned by Benjamin Griffith. He built a stone house in 1793, which is occupied as a dwelling. He kept government ammunition in the building for the use of the settlers.
- 1783 Samuel and Joseph Ralston, with their father Joseph Ralston, settled on King's Creek near where the old Ralston mill stands.
- 1784 William Ledlie settled in the county and his conveyance of land was from Patrick Henry, governor of Virginia.
- 1784 William Ledlie purchased a tract of land containing 719 acres from Abraham Edie, said tract later owned by three different parties, namely James M. Crawford, William S. Crawford and Thomas Anderson. It is located on King's Creek. The creek derived its name from one King who was the first settler on said stream. It was formerly known and called Indian creek, when in Yeughiohgeny County.
- 1785 William Logan settled on King's Creek.
- 1785 Jacob Nessly settled on Tomlinson's run, and owned all the land along the Ohio river for a mile back, and extending as far as opposite Wellsville, a distance of five miles. His first improvement was on the farm now owned by Jacob N. Brown. The fight between Andy Poe and Big Foot was on Nessly's land at the mouth of Tomlinson's run. Nessly built a block house on his land for protection against the Indians. The government's block house was built on his grounds, which was used as headquarters for the guards and spies who were engaged in watching the movements of the Indians. Isaac Mills, James Downing and George Folks, the latter of whom was captured and held as a captive by the Indians for a number of years and then made his escape, and with the above named two persons acted as spies. When Mr. Nessly made his settlement on the said tract, he improved it as fast as possible, at different places along the river, and planted orchards. A number of the fruit trees then planted by him, bear fruit nearly every season. He erected a distillery on his property in about the year 1803. The stone building used for his malthouse is still standing.
- 1785 Jacob Nessly, near Tomlinson's Run.
- 1785 William Chapman settled near New Cumberland.
- 1788 Joseph Ralston settled in Butler District.
- 1790 George Stewart settled on the farm later owned by Franklin Stewart.
- 1790 Mr. Butler settled near King's Creek.
- 1790 Oliver Brown settled in the Cove and was driven out by Indians.

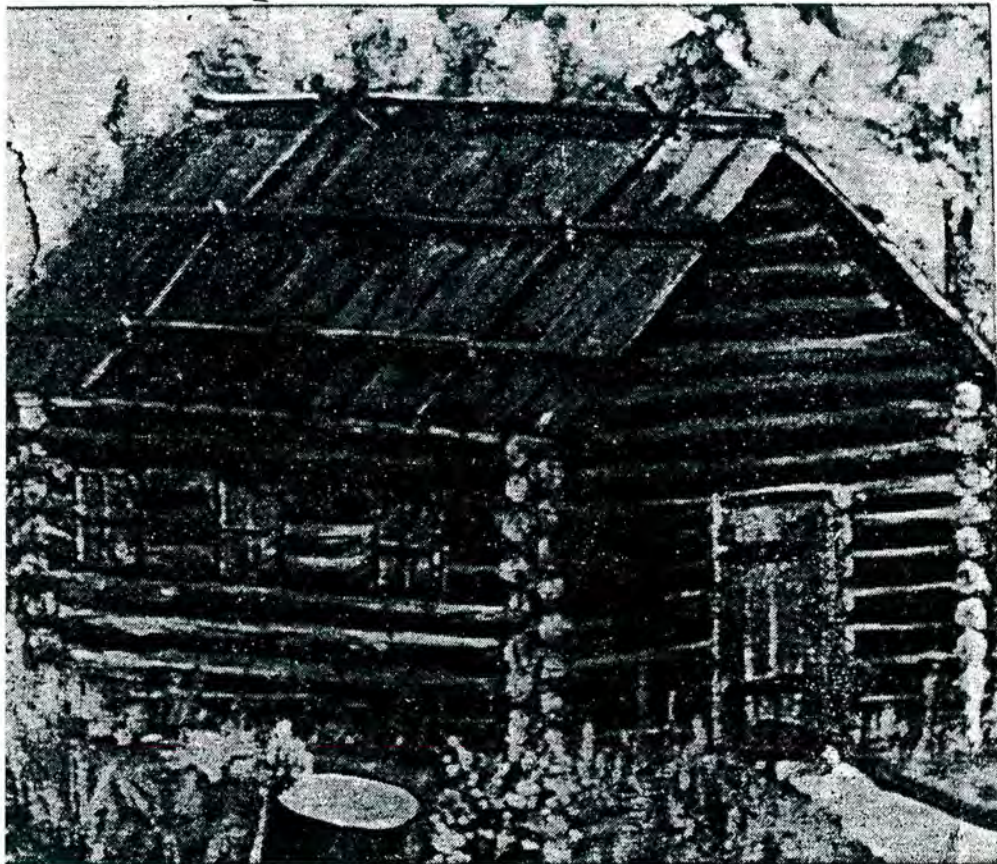
- 1792 John Eaton settled on King's Creek.
- 1792 Or 1793, John Edie, a soldier of war of 1776, settled in now Butler District. He was engaged in making nearly all the surveys for the government that were made in this section of the country for a number of years.
- 1794 John Cameron settled on the North fork of King's Creek.
- 1794 John Spivy settled on the farm later owned by his son, Nicholas Spivy and about the same time came the Cochrans, Jesse Ellis, Thomas Philson, John Gratehouse, Robert Grafton, the Hamiltons, William Ryon, the Pattersons, who built the first grist mill in the county.
- 1795 John Wiley settled.
- 1795 William Hamilton settled and laid out Hamilton town.
- 1795 John Nealeroad settled.
- 1795 W. Rodgers settled.
- 1795 A man by the name of William Rodgers, settled in what is now known as Grant district, Hancock County, on the land presently known as the Allison property.
- 1797 John Harden settled on Harden's Run.
- 1797 James Campbell settled on King's Creek, three miles from its mouth.
- 1797 Robert Campbell settled not far from the mouth of King's Creek.
- 1797 Samuel Carson settled on King's Creek.
- 1798 Alexander Morrow settled in what is now known as Butler District.
- 1798 Mr. Pittenger located here, settling on the road from Fairview to Liverpool.
- 1798 Peter Farr settled. He was a partner in the old Brooks Furnace, located on King's Creek. (Lived in Wellsburg).
- 1798 Samuel Baxter settled in now Grant district.
- 1800 George Baxter, old Mr. Corey and George Wilhelm migrated to the country.
- 1800 Samuel Williams settled in Hollidays Cove.
- 1800 Hugh Pugh settled on a four hundred acre tract where ^{Fair} ~~Fair~~view is situated.
- 1800 James Allison settled on the farm later owned by Jonathan Allison, the grandson of James, on the road leading from Fairview to Liverpool.
- 1800 Samuel Allison settled on the Wellsburg road.
- 1800 James Danlins settled.

- 1800 Samuel Caruthers settled on the headwaters of Foulinson's run, and there erected among the first still-houses in what is now Hancock County. David Pugh also had a small still-house on the same run, from about 1804 to 1812.
- 1800 J. Bailey settled on the north branch of Foulinson's run.
- 1800 James Goddard and Jacob Helmswanger settled near Feltvlew.
- 1801 Wm. Hewitt settled.
- 1801 John Gallagher settled.
- 1802 John Johnson settled on the north branch of Foulinson's Run. At this time there were a number of settlers located here.
- 1802 John Huff settled on the farm later owned by his son, William Huff.
- 1802 W. V. Evans settled on the farm later owned by Jeremiah C. Evans.
- 1802 Alexander Scott settled on the farm later owned by J. C. Scott.
- 1804 McCoy's settled in 1804 near New Cumberland.
- 1806 Christian Brumman settled.
- 1808 William Britson settled near Hamilton town.
- 1808 Heppes Geer settled.
- 1809 Andrew Young settled.
- 1812 William Langfitt settled.
- 1813 Robert Glass settled one mile east of Feltvlew.
- 1816 William Hurry settled where Hurry's mill now stands.
- 1818 Ephraim Briton settled in Hancock.
- 1818 Jacob J. Tope settled in Hollidays Cove.
- 1819 E. Rodgers settled.
- 1819 John Crawford settled on the farm later owned by W. L. Crawford.
- 1819 Roland Rogers settled.
- 1823 William Ketterer settled in what is now Grant district.
- 1827 Samuel E. Harris settled on the farm later owned by Alfred B. Harris.
- 1828 Samuel Bunting settled.

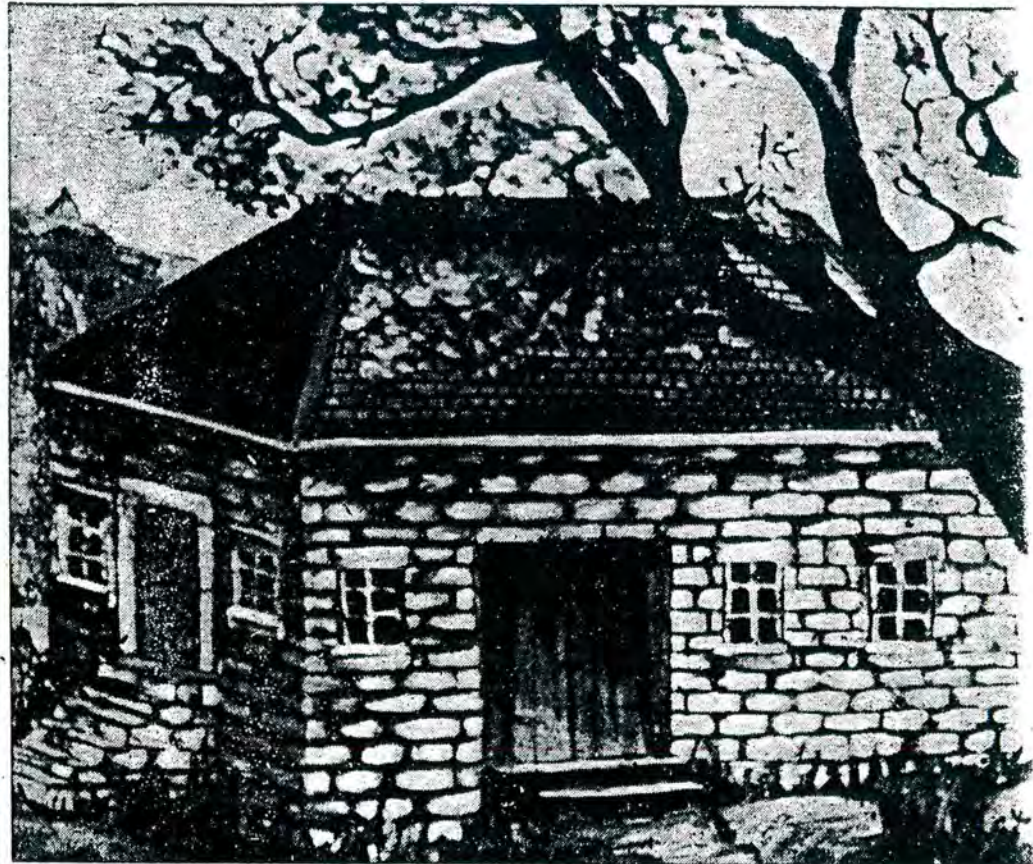
Thomas Bailey, John A. Johnson, John Lowe, David Werk and Richard Fowler were early settlers, whose dates of settlement are unknown.

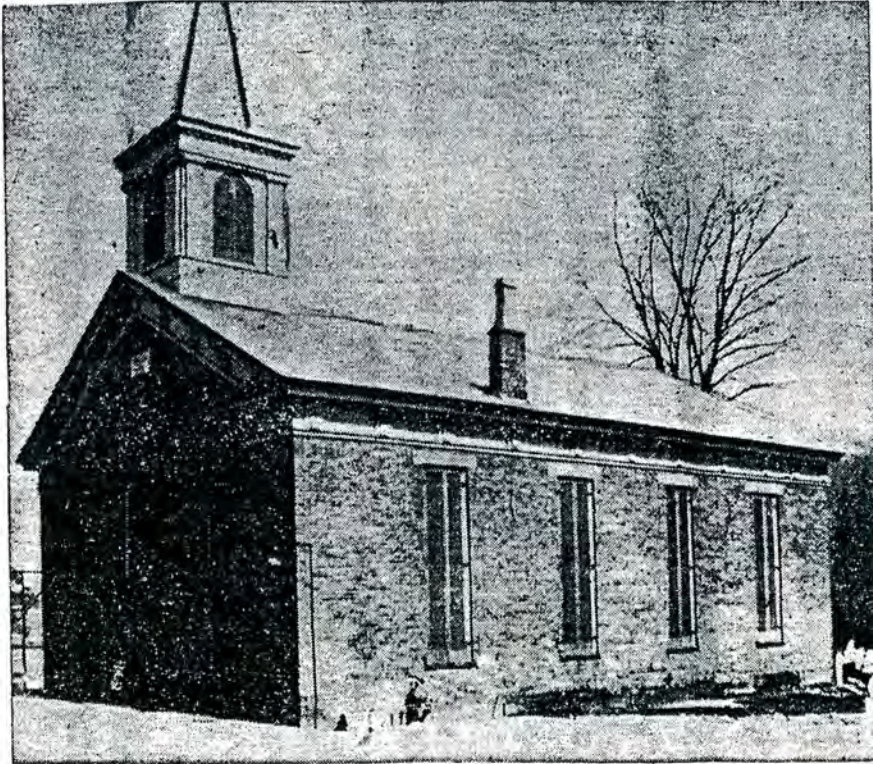

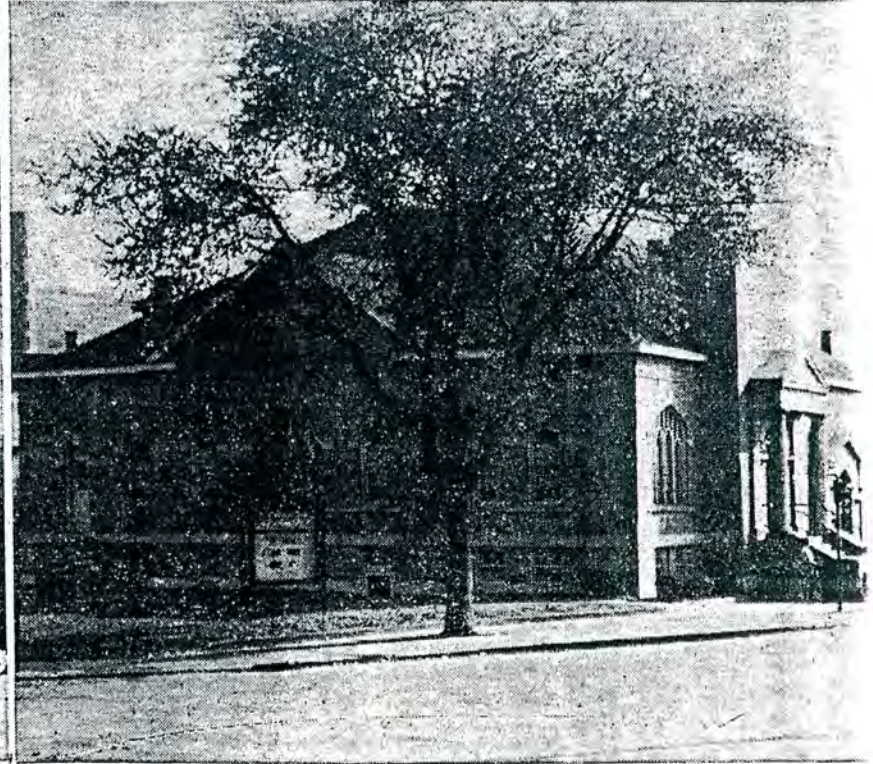
Log Cabin on Weirton Heights Served as First Church in 1790

Congregation Sets Program For Oct. 30

WEIRTON — The congregation of Cove United Presbyterian Church will celebrate the 170th anniversary of the founding of the local church and the 100th anniversary of its location and its present site Sunday, Oct. 30.

Dr. John Strock of Parkersburg, joint representative in the West Virginia Synod of the Boards of Christian Education and National Missions of the United Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., will be the speaker. The Rev. G. Ousley Brown is pastor.

CHARLES CAMPBELL, a member of the fifth generation of the seven generations of the Campbell family who have served the church will be honored.

A display of relics belonging to pioneer families of the church will be exhibited.

Members of the 170th anniversary committee are Mrs. Frank D. Bowman, chairman; Mrs. Robert Rinehart, Mrs. J. Arlington Campbell, Mrs. Mary Ferguson, the Rev. Mr. Brown, Alex McIntosh and George H. Campbell.

CHARLES CAMPBELL, who is 66 years old, has been a member of the church for 47 years. He has been an elder 24 years, clerk of the session 14 years, and a member of the choir some 63 years. He was also Sunday School superintendent for some time. Mr. Campbell is known for his work in collecting a history of the area and has done work in the field of education.

He is the great-great-grandson of James Campbell, who donated the land for the first church. The present Mr. Campbell, along with Erwin Hindman, a 55-year member, have attended the church since birth.

AMONG ARTICLES in the display will be the Bible of the Rev. John Brice, who delivered the first sermon in the old church in 1790. The Rev. Mr. Brice is the great-great-great-grandfather of Mrs. Bowman and Kenneth C. Campbell, both of whom attend the Cove Church.

The name of the church, then Three Springs Church was first recorded by the Presbytery of Redstone. The first edifice, a log building, was built in 1790 on the farm of James Campbell on what is now Weirton Heights. Part of the land donated by the pioneer, was a grant from Patrick Henry, then governor of Virginia, and a portion was a Tomahawk Grant.

Mr. Campbell and his neighbors erected the church and the Rev. Elisha McCurdy was installed as pastor in 1799. The Rev. Mr. McCurdy, known as one of the greatest evangelists of the area, locally led the Great Revival of 1805, a protestant movement which swept

the country. The revival began in the local church.

THE SECOND CHURCH was built of stone in 1804 in what is now Three Springs Cemetery. Settlers continued to stock guns beside the edifice, and men stood guard in case of Indian attack.

The congregation divided in 1846 and the Holliday Cove Presbyterian Church was formed. The congregation held services in the old Academy Building which stood on the site of the present Cove School Building until 1860.

A LOT WAS DONATED by the heirs of J. N. D. Brown and at a congregational meeting in February, 1860, it was decided to erect a house of worship on what is the present site of Cove United Presbyterian Church. Cost of the brick church was \$2,500. It was supplied by principals of the Steubenville Female Seminary until 1866. The Rev. John Graham was pastor in 1866 and the Rev. Cyrus C. Allen in 1890.

THE REV. HOMER G. McMILLAN became pastor in August, 1910. The influx of families as a result of the construction of the Weirton Steel Co. mills caused membership to increase. The present church was built in 1914 at a cost of \$20,000. There are presently some 1,200 members.

Names of the families who helped establish the church still live in the community. Various locations have been named after them — Gullette Lane, Purdy Lane, Crawford's Crossing, Le Avenue, Brown's Island, Campbell Addition and Hooker Addition.

AMONG YOUNG MEN of the church who entered the ministry are the Rev. Franklin McHendry and the Rev. Mr. Taylor McHendry, son of Mrs. Adelaide McHendry and the late George McHendry, and the Rev. Robert Marsh, son of Mrs. Martha Marsh.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

In 1830, a few names, among whom are the following: Ephraim Bride and wife, Archy Scott and wife, George Scott and wife, Thomas Mahan and wife, Sarah Moorehead and Martha Ralston, organized, under Rev. Kent's directions, into a Methodist Episcopal society. For a number of years their services were conducted in private houses, and for the most part in A. Scott's and T. Mahan's residences. Not until 1848 did the congregation feel able to build an edifice to worship in. They erected a brick church that year, which was dedicated, as soon as completed, by Rev. Dorsey. In the year 1861, the building was destroyed by fire. From that time up to 1875, they held divine service in the Lick Run school house. The latter part of that year a new frame church was completed on King's creek, near the Ralston mills, at a cost of \$1,000. It was dedicated January 1, 1876, by Rev. James Miller, presiding elder of the Pittsburgh conference. The pulpit is filled by Rev. Stephenson at present.

Revs. Lock, Kent, Bradshaw, Dallis, Jackson, Warner, Hays, Long, Dorsey, Monroe, Loman, Barnhart, Stiffey, Baker, Hudson, Rich, Kesler, Pugh and Hudson have been ministers on the circuit.

Its present membership is about twenty-five.

Sabbath School.—A small though live Sabbath school, under the superintendency of Reason Ralston, has been in good running order for some time.

The Presbyterian Church was divided about the year 1812, part going to Paris, about four miles distant, and the other part to Holiday Cove, W. Va.--Two miles the other way. The first church was a log one and stood down at the lower end of the Cemetery, near one of the Springs. The Cemetery received its name from Three Springs that are located within the cemetery. The second church was a frame one and stood on top of the hill where the tool house now stands.

The Cemetery is kept in good condition especially the new part that incorporated and kept by the Company. The Old Part is kept by the County and is not nearly so nicely kept.

The first known ancestors of the Hulick family are Joseph and Elizabeth Little Phillis. The "Commemorative Biographical Record of Washington County, Pennsylvania" states in a short sketch of the former that he was born in Ireland about 1744, and was married in that country to Elizabeth Little. He came to America in 1775 and settled near the village of Mc Donald, Pa. It further states he was a soldier in the Revolutionary war, and after its close settled on a part of the Hoagland and Crawford tract in Smith Twp., Washington Co., Pa, and on May 10, 1776 received the first genuine land title issued in Smith Twp. A portion of this tract is still owned and farmed by a member of the Phillis family. The Biographical Record states that Joseph Phillis died in 1830 at an advanced age, his wife having "gone before" in 1827. However, this seems to be in error as recently I copied the following from their headstones in the cemetery at the top of the hill on East Pittsburgh Street in Burgettstown, Pa.

Joseph Phillis departed this life 18 April 1831 in the 80th year of his age. (This would make the year of his birth 1751 or 1752)

Elizabeth Phillis departed this life 12th Dec. 1825 in the 63rd year of her age which would make the year of her birth 1762 or 1763

Children of Joseph and Elizabeth Phillis as shown in the Biographical Record, except the date of death for Jacob Phillis, and date of birth and death of Catherine.

1. John, died in Guernsey Co., Ohio, the father of 16 children
2. James, deceased in lumber regions of Pa.
3. Joseph, passed latter years of his life in Columbiana Co., Ohio.
4. Jacob born April 8, 1792 in Smith Twp., Washington Co., Pa. He died in 1847. (His headstone in the East Pittsburgh Street cemetery reads, "Jacob Phillis died March 7, 184 - last figure not clear--aged 53 years, 11 mos." This would make the date of his death March 7, 1846. Married Ann Bruce, born July 13, 1798; died Dec. 17, 1871. (Her headstone next to his gives the date of her death as Dec. 16, 1871.)
5. William, deceased in youth (There is a stone in the same cemetery erected to the memory of a William Phillis, but the inscription is no longer legible.)
6. Thomas, passed entire life in Smith Twp.
7. Nancy, wife of David Alexander, a farmer of Smith Twp.
8. Elizabeth, married to Thomas Cherry of Mt. Pleasant Twp.
9. Jane, wife of Joseph Walker.
10. Catherine, born Dec. 3, 1802; died July 31, 1868. Married Gilbert Hulick.

Catherine Phillis married Gilbert Hulick. The date of their marriage is not known, but since their first child, Franklin was born Jan. 13, 1834, it probably occurred one or two years prior to that date. We have no records and only very meager information of the Hulick family. No one knows when or from where the Hulicks came to Washington, Co., where they lived, or whether there were other members of the family in Washington Co. at the time Gilbert married Catherine Phillis. Grandfather Franklin Hulick said his family was related to Beth Buchanan, a maiden lady who spent her last days in Oakdale, Pa., and to the McNall family in Washington Co. No one knows through which branch of the family these relationships existed. In a leaflet issued by the Burgettstown, Pa. U. P. Church in connection with the celebration of its 100th anniversary it listed the names of some of the old families that had belonged to the church and among them was the "Hulick family". Since Catherine Phillis and her family were members of that church, it is likely that the Gilbert Hulick family belonged there also, and the references in the leaflet was to that family.

Gilbert Hulick passed from the scene under tragic circumstances. He had taken a loaded gun down off the wall to shoot a pig for butchering when it was accidentally discharged, the bullet hitting his youngest son, William Charles, who died as a result of the wound. Whether he was killed instantly or died later is not known. At his death Gilbert Hulick disappeared, and was never heard from again. Whether in his grief over the tragic accident he destroyed himself, or went to some unknown destination to escape from the scene of the tragedy is not known.

The family seems to have continued to live in the Burgettstown area for some time after their father's disappearance. The fact that Franklin married Mary Ann Thompson of Mt. Pleasant Twp., Washington Co. in 1858 would indicate that. However, the records indicate that all the sons were located in the vicinity of Wellsburg, W. Va. and New Alexandria, Ohio at various times.

Letters to Catherine from her sons Joseph and Henry are still in existence showing that she had a Burgettstown address as late as Oct. 5, 1867. It is not known where she was at the time of her death 10 months later, and at the time of this writing, October 1963, her place of burial is unknown.

4. Henry Hulick, born Feb. 19, 1840; died Nov. 5, 1869.
Last information about him is contained in two letters written to his mother. The first written Oct. 22, 1865 from New Alexandria, Ohio states he has sold out (Didn't say what) to Frank (probably his brother Frank, as he was living there at that time) and Lem Quillin, and had bought Geo. Dawson's farm for \$10,000, and was boarding with Quillins at two dollars per week, which he considered very reasonable. The second letter from the same place on Oct. 26, 1867 contains no information about himself.
5. William Charles Hulick, born April 20, 1842; died May 27, 1851.

THOMAS H. RALSTON is a native of Brooke county, W. Va., where his ancestors were among the earliest residents along King's creek. The first member of this well-known family to locate in that vicinity was Joseph Ralston, who was born and married in Scotland. He came to America prior to the Revolution, and finally settled in Brooke county, W. Va., where he took up a vast tract of land on King's creek. Indians were numerous then, and wild beasts roamed through the forest, making pioneer life extremely dangerous. The family of

Joseph Ralston consisted of but two sons, Joseph and Samuel. They were frequently taken with the mother to Fort Pitt (where Pittsburgh now stands), while the father lived for months in his cabin in the wilderness, without a fire, lest the attention of the Indians should be attracted. Joseph Ralston and his wife passed their days on the farm, and in a good old age were laid to rest in Three Springs cemetery, Brooke county, W. Va. The land, which had then increased in value, was left to his two sons. Samuel (the younger son), was married to Martha Tucker, of Hanover township, who bore him four sons and eight daughters, all of whom lived to marry and have children.

Joseph Ralston, eldest son of Joseph, was first married to Ann McCready, of Beaver county, who lived with her parents on Mill creek, now Hookstown, Penn. They were early settlers in that section, and of Irish descent. To this union were born ten sons and one daughter. The youngest child, named McCready, died unmarried at the age of twenty-eight years, and the only daughter was married to Daniel Wilson; the others were also married. The mother died and was buried in Three Springs cemetery. For his second choice Joseph Ralston selected Sarah Greer, a native of Carroll county, Ohio, living near Harlem Springs. She bore him seven children, of whom one died in infancy, and another never married. The father lived to be about seventy-two years of age, dying about 1835. The greater part of his life was passed in farming, and he built the first gristmill in that country. His property became very valuable, and the gristmill was owned and operated by his descendants of the two generations following. After a long and useful life, he was laid to rest in Three Springs cemetery, where his parents and wives were buried.

Joseph Ralston was the oldest of the eleven children born to Joseph and Ann (McCready) Ralston. He was born March 5, 1791, on the old homestead in Brooke county, W. Va. When a young man he learned the miller's trade in his father's mill, and finally took charge of the business, which he conducted for many years. In 1817 he married Lucinda P. Holmes, who was born March 7, 1795, east of the mountains. She was a daughter of Thomas and Nancy (McNeely) Holmes, both of whom were natives of County Donegal, Ireland. The McNeely family was an eminent one in Ireland, and the brothers of Nancy were all legislators there. Thomas Holmes was a shoemaker, and in about 1789 came to America, locating temporarily near New York City. He removed farther west and settled in Brooke county, W. Va., where he died at the age of ninety-six years. His wife died when over one hundred years old, in Guernsey county, Ohio, at the home of her son, Isaac Holmes.

The children of Joseph and Lucinda P. (Holmes) Ralston were born as follows: Isaac, was killed when a young man, by a horse; Mary A., is the wife of J. H. Harper, of Burgettstown, Penn.; Joseph, a miller, while taking a cargo of flour to New Orleans, contracted bilious fever in that city, died May 30, 1846; Thomas H., whose sketch follows; Eli, deceased at the age of two years; Caroline, Mrs. Miller Shane, of Burgettstown, Penn.; and William, a school teacher, died January 1, 1861, at the age of twenty-eight years. Mr. Ralston passed his life on the old place, and followed milling. He was a soldier in the war of 1812, and voted with the Democratic party. He and his wife were members of the Presbyterian Church at Three Springs, of which he was an elder for many years. In 1846, while on a trip to Buffalo, N. Y., with a cargo of flour, he was taken sick with bilious fever, and returning home, died July 18, 1846, followed by his wife December 26, of the same year. They were buried in Three Springs cemetery, which now contains four generations of this name, who were at one time by far the most numerous family on King's creek.

Thomas H. Ralston was born July 19, 1826, in Hancock county, W. Va., on the ancestral acres. In early life he learned the cooper's trade, in which he became an expert. When his elder brother died, he took charge of his father's mill, in which business he continued many years. On April 26, 1859, he was married to Rebecca Graham, who was born January 17, 1833, in Hancock county, W. Va., a daughter of Thomas and Honor Graham. Their union has been blessed with the following children: Lucinda P. (Mrs. James Work, of Florence), William S. (a farmer of Hanover township), George G. (at home), Anna K. (Mrs. S. F. Campbell, of Hanover township), and Jessie M. (at home). Mr. Ralston conducted the old mill until April 10, 1873, when he came to Hanover township, Washington county, locating on the "Moses McLaughlin" place, where he has since resided. He is now following farming and stock raising, having made many improvements on the place, which are indicative of his progressive spirit. He owns several good farms, and is one of the leading men of Hanover township. He, his wife and children are members of the Frankfort Presbyterian Church.
