# Senior Class History

Late in August of 1939, a large group of puzzled and immature students entered Union High School. Very little was accomplished that year since the students had to become accustomed to the high school routine. The annual Halloween party was held on October 26, which was the first chance many of the students had to get acquainted. We were well represented in the various clubs, musical and sport activities. We chose the following class officers: President, Joe Gratchen; Vice-President, Jules Darras; Secretary-Treasurer, Matilda Pensak.

When we returned in 1940, it was our turn to initiate the Freshmen and a very thorough job was done. Our representation in all activities increased that year and a few boys made the football, basketball and baseball squads. Our class party was held on February 19, and was very well attended. For our class officers we chose: President, Matilda Pensak; Vice-President, William Sachan; Secretary, George Majernik, Treasurer, Richard George.

At the beginning of the Junior year, we considered ourselves older and wiser. We were engaged in many activities. Many of the boys starred in the various athletic events. As a part of our class project, we donated a ditto machine to the school on which our school paper. The Union Hi-Lite, is printed. In February, we chose rings by Josten Co. The Junior play, "Little Women," under the direction of Miss Cruikshank, was held on April 17. It was one of the most successful plays yet produced in Union. The Junior party was held, April 24. Our Junior activities came to an end with the Junior-Senior Prom, May 29. The gymnasium was elaborately decorated in a Pan-American setting with flags of many countries represented. Music was furnished by Rio Richart's orchestra. The officers chosen for that year were: President, William Sachan; Vice-President, Richard George; Secretary, Pete Maropis; Treasurer, Saturno Prendes.

On September 8, 1943, 157 students returned for their final year. We selected the following officers: President, Matilda Pensak; Vice-President, Joe Gratchen; Secretary, Hazel Cunningham; Treasurer, Saturno Prendes. All the classes participated in the magazine sales contest but the Seniors topped the list. The boys and girls sold candy during the football games and during the noon hour. The Senior class play, "The Millionaire," a emedy under the direction of Miss Cruikshank, was given January 14. The Hi-Lite, published by the Seniors, has been the best yet. The Senior pictures were taken in January, and the Seniors were dressed up for the occasion. The class party was held, March 5. As spring rolled around, the Seniors found themselves in a whirl. Plans were being made for commencement and a pageant. Then before we realized it, we were bidding farewell to the school where we had spent four years, to the teachers who guided us so carefully, and to our classmates.



Miss Forsythe, the sponsor, joined the WAVES in February. The members of the club assisted the school by conducting girls' gym classes until another physical education teacher was secured.


