HE publication of this, our 1944 "U," marks it's first anniversary. We are the first class, in many years to have a complete set of year books, as a record of our four years at Union.



Freshmen

September 7, 1943 two hundred six excited Freshmen entered the halls of Union. After a few days of hazing they settled down. They organized the class and elected their officers: President, Wade Buckwalter; Vicepresident, Angel Gonzalez, and Secretary-Treasurer was Ascension Campas.

These entering Freshmen remind us Seniors of our freshmen days. We entered Union, August 28, 1940, two hundred forty-eight scared students not knowing the way around and suffering from the pranks of upper classmen. We organized in early October and chose the following officers: President, George Pugh; Vice-president, Joe Horovitz; Secretary, Ruth Friday and Treasurer, Louise Jackson. We had our first "get-together," a Hallowe'en Party, in October. It was our first social event.

Our class was soon well represented on the football and basketball teams and in the clubs. By June, 1941, many of us were looking forward to another year at Union.







This year's staff was divided into two groups with the hope of adding more improvements to the "U." The Editorial Staff handled the literary work. The Business Staff worked with the financial matters involved in the publishing of an annual. The members on the staff gained useful experience and information.

Four hundred copies of the "U" were sold. The staff sponsored an Amateur Hour to which purchasers of the "U" were admitted free of charge. Many students entered the contest. Glen Hicks was the winner of the program and received a free "U."

About a month after this school term began, the Union Hi-Lite appeared. Our school paper was printed by an inexperienced staff. With each edition the paper improved. The students on this staff take a course in Journalism to aid in their newspaper work. The positions on the staff rotate so that each may have a variety of experiences in writing for newspaper work. The Staff also printed programs for the football games.

The Hi-Lite sends free of charge nearly seventy-five copies each month to our graduates and faculty in the service. In honor of members of the faculty in the armed forces the Hi-Lite presented a service flag to the school. 

One of the first things the students did as a class was to choose a class project. The Seniors have always sold candy at noon and at the football games and have conducted magazine campaigns to make money for their class project. Our class bought a cyclorama for the

The members of the "U" Staff were chosen very early this year and got to work as soon as possible. They held the sales campaign early in the year so that the "U" could be published sooner. On October 3, 4, the Seniors had their pictures taken. All Seniors were dressed up for that occasion. The Hi-Lite, this year, is an all-girl staff. The journalism class takes care of publishing the paper. We think this Hi-Lite is the best and neatest that has been published by any journalism class so far.

On December 17, 1943 the class presented the annual Senior play, "Thumbs Up," under the direction of Miss Cruikshank. The cyclorama was installed and used during our play. A formal presentation of the cyclorama to the school was made by Ruth Friday, president. John Melton, President of the Student Council, accepted the cyclorama on behalf of the student body.

When the New Year came in it brought a lot of ideas for the class to think of and to do. One of the first things the class did this year was to choose their commencement invitations. On the 19th of January the Seniors held the class party. Because the party was for the boys that were entering the service from our class, it was held in style. The music was furnished by Eddie Collins and his orchestra. Everybody enjoyed the dancing, refreshments, and the vocalizing of some of the boys and girls of our class.

The draft hit our class hard taking eight of our Senior boys into the service of our country just at the beginning of our second semester. Alex Yandrich, Jim Bertolotti, Andy Baloga, Bill Diamond, Pete Gobleck, Joe Roman, Til Stura, and Mike Hayden. We are proud to be so well represented

by these boys.

Spring! Spring! Beautiful Spring-Seniors run hither and thither and are excited and busy people. They must make plans for their pageant and graduation . . . Final exams must be met and passed—or else . . . Name cards must be written and exchanged ... The "U" must be auto $g\ r\ a\ p\ h\ e\ d\dots$ Those last walks up Highland Avenue must be taken... Here and there and everywhere are groups of Seniors discussing at great length their plans for the coming summer and the future...But the climax of the Spring activities is Commencement ... when we bid Union a fond farewell.


