



The Sophomores looked forward to their class party in early April and the fun they would have at other affairs. They had a very enjoyable year and hoped that next year would top it.





The membership of the Athletic Council includes students, faculty members, and school board members. The faculty members are faculty manager, coach, principal and supervising principal. The school board members are those chosen by the president of the board. The students are elected by the student body.

The duties of the Athletic Council are to ap-

prove schedules and budgets, determine athletic policies, set admission prices and to aid with the athletic program wherever possible. All their meetings are subject to call by the president.

At the end of each school year the Athletic Council winds up its affairs by giving the last formal dance of the year—the Athletic Dance.

Organized in 1917 when construction of Union High School was started, the Burgettstown-Smith Township Joint School Board, though somewhat unwieldy because of its make-up, has functioned rather satisfactorily for the past twenty-eight years. It is composed of all members of the School Boards of Burgettstown Borough and Smith Township, making a total membership of twelve, five from Burgettstown and seven from Smith

Township. This Board meets currently on the second Wednesday of each month to transact all business relating to the operation and maintenance of Union High School. Each school district helps to finance the high school chiefly in proportion to the number of pupils enrolled from that district. Other districts whose pupils attend Union High School pay a monthly tuition fee for those pupils to the Joint School Board.


