Mr. Justus was born at Florerce, Washington Co., Pa, April 29th, 1807. In 1846 he married Miss Mary J. Bell. At the age of twenty he united with the church of Florence, under the ministry of R v. Elisha McCurdy, D D In 1844 he revered his connection with this church and beames member of the Mr. Piscah church Dr. S. C. nection with this church and became a member of the Mt. Pissah church, Dr. S. C. Jennings, pastor, where he remained until 1852, when he came to Mansfield. In 1871 he re joined Mt. Pisgah church, in which, from 1882 until the time of his death, he was a ruling elder. The last two years of his life, his health not permitting him to attend Mt. Pisgah, he worshiped with the Man field congregation, R. v. J. M. Duff, Ph.D., pastor. "That is all right," he remarked. Coming toward the close of life he seemed to hear his heavenly Father's voice, "Set thine house in order, for thou shalt die and not live." That voice he heard without the least degree of alarm. His departure was but to him a juyful jurney, for which he was fully prepared.
