Fumes From Idling Motor of Truck Causes Death of Native of Hanover Township

Lee McNary Withrow of Glenwillard, Allegheny county, died suddenly on Monday morning, January 30th, from inhaling the fumes of carbon monoxide gas while employed on a county road job near Coraopolis. Mr. Withrow had hired his truck to the county and had kept the engine running while waiting his turn to have his truck loaded by the steam shovel. In some manner he inhaled the deadly fumes.

Mr. Withrow was born at Murdocksville, July 5, 1880. He was the only son of John S. Withrow, a native of Hanover township, Washington county, who was a well-known miller of his day, having operated most of the mills on Raccoon creek between Burgettstown and the Ohio river. Later in life, the father left the Murdocksville mill and settled on a farm in Hanover township, in Beaver county, where he resided up to the time of his death. 


